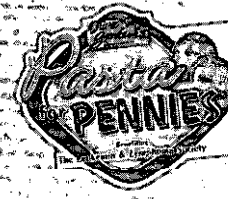


COLLECT SPARE CHANGE AND CHANGE LIVES.

Their school will be joining over 1,100 other schools across the Greater Los Angeles area in a program that will be instrumental in raising funds for lifesaving cancer research.

They will be taking part in The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's (LLS) Pasta for Pennies, presented by Olive Garden. During a three-week period, students collect spare change to support LLS's mission: to cure leukemia, lymphoma, Hodgkin's disease and myeloma, and to improve the quality of life of patients and their families.
